### *Ohio Department of Administrative Services*

The Ohio Department of Administrative Services (ODAS) is responsible for providing support services to state agencies. ODAS is organized into five divisions: Collective Bargaining, Equal Opportunity, General Services, Human Resources, and the Office of Information Technology. The director of ODAS is appointed by the governor and confirmed by the Ohio Senate. ODAS is funded through the General Revenue Fund and fees charged to agencies for services provided.

### *Ohio Department of Education*

The Ohio Department of Education (ODE) oversees all public school districts and public community schools; and monitors educational service centers, early learning programs, and state-chartered nonpublic schools. ODE also administers funding to the schools, collects student data, develops academic standards and curricula, administers state achievement tests, and licenses education personnel. The department is governed by a 19-member State Board of Education with 11 elected members and 8 members appointed by the governor. The board hires the Superintendent of Public Instruction who is responsible for the day-to-day operations of the department. The Ohio Department of Education is funded through General Revenue Funds, federal funding, and transfers from lottery profits.

## *Ohio Department of Health*

The Ohio Department of Health (ODH) was established by the General Assembly in 1917. While the initial focus of the department was to control and prevent the spread of infectious disease, ODH is now responsible for providing preventative medical services, public health education and information, and providing other healthcare services and regulatory duties. The mission of ODH is “to protect and improve the health of all Ohioans by preventing disease, promoting good health, and assuring access to quality health care.” The director of ODH is appointed by the governor and confirmed by the Ohio Senate. The Ohio Department of Health is funded through General Revenue Funds, federal funds, and fees charged for various regulatory activities.

## *Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services*

The Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services (OhioMHAS) is a newly created agency combining two former cabinet departments – the Ohio Department of Alcohol and Drug Addiction Services and the Ohio Department of Mental Health. Effective July 1, 2013, the combined agencies are responsible for the development and administration of a comprehensive statewide plan to provide behavioral health services. These services are provided by local boards throughout the state that are responsible for creating, funding, overseeing, and evaluating services. The director of OhioMHAS is appointed by the governor and confirmed by the Ohio Senate. Funding is provided through the General Revenue Funds, federal funding, and an allocation of various fees paid to other state agencies.

*Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction*

The Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction (ODRC) is charged with the supervision of felony offenders in the custody of the state, including providing housing, following their release from incarceration, and monitoring the individuals through the parole authority. The department also oversees the community control sanction system that provides judges with sentencing options to reduce the inmate population. There are currently 31 correctional institutions throughout the state. The director of ODRC is appointed by the governor and confirmed by the Ohio Senate. ODRC is funded through General Revenue Funds, federal funding, and revenue earned through sales from the Ohio Penal Industries.

*Ohio Department of Transportation*

The Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) is responsible for maintaining the state's system of highways, as well as overseeing the state's rail, aviation and public transportation systems. The department has 12 districts along with a central office located in Columbus, Ohio. The director is appointed by the governor and confirmed by the Ohio Senate. The majority of ODOT's funding comes from federal and state taxes on motor fuels.

*Ohio Department of Veteran Services*

The Ohio Department of Veterans Services (ODVS) was established as a state agency on August 31, 2008. The purpose of the department is to identify veterans in need of assistance, connect veterans with services and programs, and to advocate for veterans and their families. The director of ODVS is appointed by the governor and confirmed by the Ohio Senate. Funding for ODVS is provided through General Revenue Funds, federal funding, and fees assessed for those at the Ohio Veterans Homes. ODVS is also responsible for awarding monetary bonuses to eligible veterans with funding received through bond sales.

The Ohio Veterans Homes are also part of ODVS. The first home was created in Sandusky County in 1888, and a second home was opened in Georgetown (Brown County) in November 2003.

## *Ohio Department of Youth Services*

The Ohio Department of Youth Services (ODYS) is responsible for the rehabilitation of delinquent juveniles. This is accomplished through the operation of juvenile correctional facilities, regional parole offices, community correctional facilities and support for community-based programs. The director of ODYS is appointed by the governor and confirmed by the Ohio Senate. Funding is provided through General Revenue Funds, federal funding, and transfers from the Ohio Department of Education.

## *Ohio State Board of Pharmacy*

The State Board of Pharmacy, first created in 1884, is responsible for administering and enforcing various pharmacy, dangerous drug, controlled substances and criminal drug laws in the state of Ohio. The Board's responsibilities are divided into regulation (licensing and monitoring of pharmacists, pharmacy interns, terminal and wholesale distributors, and enforcing criminal drug laws) and prescription monitoring including the maintenance of the Ohio Automated Rx Reporting System (OARRS), an electronic database that collects information on all prescriptions for controlled substances that are issued by licensed prescribers and dispensed by pharmacies in Ohio. The Board is comprised of nine members, eight of whom are licensed pharmacists and

one is a member of the public at least sixty years of age, who serve four year terms. The Board hires an executive director who oversees the day-to-day operations of the agency.
